Meeting the cost of education 2025

School costs & fees

Victorian Government schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum from Foundation to Year 10, VCE and VCAL.

Schools can request contributions under 3 categories:

- ⇒ Curriculum contributions are voluntary contributions that cover necessary curriculum items and activities for the student to learn the curriculum.
- ⇒ Other contributions are voluntary contributions for non-curriculum items and activities relating to the schools function and objectives.
- ⇒ Extra-curricular items & activities are optional and can include optional events, excursions, camps, sport, music or items that don't relate to the curriculum.
- * Schools cannot consider non-payment of curriculum or other contributions as an outstanding payment.
- * Contribution requests cannot be carried forward from the previous year.

Subject enrolment fees

Subject enrolment fees (including VET courses and electives) are <u>voluntary contributions</u> and cannot be included as extra-curricular items or activities.

Educational items for students to own

Students can choose to own items such as stationery, textbooks (paper or digital), calculators or digital devices. If a parent does not provide or purchase their own educational items, the school must ensure the student has free access to what is needed at school to enable the delivery of the curriculum. Schools are not required to provide items to own or keep on a one-to-one basis.

Camps & Excursions

Schools may ask parents to make a <u>curriculum</u> <u>contribution</u> towards the costs of compulsory excursions related to the curriculum.

*Schools cannot restrict student attendance or participation in excursions if their parents have not paid.

How can my school help?

Schools must prepare for and support families who are experiencing financial hardship to enable students to participate fully in the school program.

If you are experiencing hardship, speak to the school Wellbeing Officer, Principal or nominated parent payment contact person.

Schools should:

- ⇒ Remind families that curriculum & other contributions are voluntary.
- ⇒ **Establish** flexible payment plans for extra curricular items and activities, or waive, reduce or extend payments.



- ⇒ **Create** strategies that assist with the exchange of second-hand items to own such as textbooks, uniforms and stationery.
- ⇒ **Refer** to government or community assistance programs that help families purchase uniforms or educational items to own.
- ⇒ **Communicate** in a language that is easy to understand, culturally appropriate, inclusive and non-judgmental.
- \Rightarrow **Provide** interpreting and translation services.

Uniform & shoes

State Schools' Relief (SSR) provides support to Victorian students attending a government primary, secondary or specialist school.

SSR can assist with uniforms, school shoes, socks, hats, underwear, swimwear, school bags, graphing calculators and 30-day travel passes. Assistance for textbooks and digital devices will be on a case by case basis.

Preps and Year 7 recipients of the Camps Sports & Excursion Fund (CSEF) automatically qualify for a uniform package.

Additional uniform assistance is available throughout the year through the welfare program. All referrals are made through the school.

Government assistance



Child Care

Care Subsidy (CCS): Paid to approved child care providers to reduce the amount of child care fees families pay. An eligible child must be 13 years or younger and not in high school, or 14-18 with a disability.

Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS): A top-up payment in addition to CCS. To qualify you must be transitioning to work from income support, be a grandparent (principal carer) receiving income support, be experiencing temporary financial hardship, or require practical assistance to support your child's safety and wellbeing.

Outside School Hours Care (OSHC): Care for primary school age children outside school hours and during school holidays. Talk to your school about what is available or check with your local council for secondary school options.

School Student Broadband Initiative

SSBI provides free home internet for one year for families with children enrolled in an Australian school who do not have an active NBN network internet service at home. Marrung education scholarships

Camps, Sports & Excursions

The Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF) provides payments for eligible students to attend school camps, sports and excursions in primary and secondary school. Only one application is allowed for separated families where both parents hold a concession card. Unspent funds are transferred to the next year or new school. Contact your school to apply.

School Saving Bonus (SSB) in available for 2025. The one-off \$400 payment per student attending a Victorian government school or eligible students in non-government schools is to help cover the costs of school uniforms, text-books, excursions and activities. Get Active Kids Voucher Program helps eligible families get their kids involved in organised sport and recreation activities by reimbursing the cost of membership and registration fees, uniforms and equipment. Travel



Victorian Student Pass provides unlimited travel on all public transport within Victoria to full time Victorian primary and secondary students. The cost depends on the type of pass. Call 1800 800 007 or visit PTV. www.ptv.vic.gov.au

Conveyance Allowance Program (CAP):

A contribution towards the cost of transporting students to and from their nearest

school by public transport, car or school bus where the nearest school is more than 4.8km from home. Students must live in rural and regional Victoria or attend an eligible specialist school. Contact your school for more information or click on the link below.

Budgeting and finances



Reducing your costs

⇒ Budget for rent, food and bills before entering into a payment plan for extra curricular items and activities. Be realistic in what you can afford.



- ⇒ **Plan** school lunches, make your own snacks, buy in bulk
- ⇒ **Label** all school items
- ⇒ **Cycle** to school if there is a good, safe route
- ⇒ **Reuse** stationery rather than buying new each year
- ⇒ **Swap** books and uniforms with friends & neighbours or at your school's swap days
- ⇒ Shop around for sale items rather than expensive brands. Stationery shops may be cheaper than school ordering. Officeworks will price match and give a 20% discount on identical items if their advertised price is the more expensive.
